

Creating Creature Heads

I had some very fixed and furry ideas for my animals in this production. I am not known for doing things by halves! If it needs to be done, it should be done well. To that end I began making the animal heads 2 long years ago.

Most of the materials used for these are upcycled from donated items, other costumes and bits I found in my own craft room! That they cost very little in terms of money is a happy bonus to the satisfaction of creation somehow!

The main structure of the heads is sculpted from mattress foam (1). These pieces are held together with spray glue until the next layer is applied. The fur is the next layer applied (2), and as this is upcycled from other costumes, they are a bit of a patchwork! Once the panels of fur have been glued the complete ears – foam based again – are attached with glue, then sewn on (3).

All of the pieces of patchwork are then sewn together as the glue alone will not hold firmly enough. All costumes need to be hard wearing, and these heads are no exception.

Eyes – be they green gel plastic, buttons, or red lights – are inserted as the final feature (4).

The headband of an old baseball cap is then glued and fitted into the crown of the base of the head as a strong structure to then attach the elastic that goes under the chin.

Appropriate fabric is then glued to the underside of the head to cover any scrappy bits that we don't want to see!

Rowena Sterry


Ensemble
